Retired stockbroker Greg Soudure expertly turns a lathe as he puts the finishing touches to a wooden bowl.

Fellow baby boomers fix chairs, chests of drawers and old bicycles, or toil away on their own woodwork creations. This giant shed in a smart suburb of south Perth is one of more than 1,300 across Australia offering a haven for older men with plenty of time on their hands.

Cooking, social media and beekeeping classes are among a range of activities on offer at the Showgrounds Community Men's Shed, a building once used to show off farm animals at the Perth Royal Show, the city's annual agricultural show.

Soudure, 73, said his wife urged him to join shortly after he retired a couple of years ago as he was spending his days monitoring the financial markets on his laptop.

"Now she has no difficulty getting me out of the house," he added.

Australia has taken pottering around in a shed to another level, spawning a grassroots movement to help provide camaraderie for frustrated or lonely older men around the world.

This year members are marking 30 years of "shedding", with parties and barbecues planned. To celebrate, more than 250 members from 92 sheds have just taken part in relay legs of a 2,000-mile bicycle trip around Western Australia.

The inspiration for the community men's shed came from Maxine Chaseling, a care worker, who established the first one in Goolwa, South

Australia in 1993. She had the idea when her father sank into depression after being forced to give up work following a heart attack.

The simple concept struck a chord and there are now more men's sheds in Australia than branches of McDonald's.

Other countries have cottoned on too, including the UK, which has almost 550 sheds and 129 more under construction

In total there are now almost 3,000 men's sheds operating across 12 countries including Ireland, New Zealand, Canada, America, Kenya and South Africa.

Although many sheds now welcome women and some younger men drop in to hone their DIY skills, the typical profile of a "shedder" in Australia is a white male in his mid-70s.

Trevor Gorey, president of Men's Sheds of Western Australia, is a former

chartered accountant who is now a dab hand at making Irish limerick harps. The 80year-old joined a local men's shed in Perth seven years ago, not long after retiring.

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"I was at a bit of a loose end and was looking for something to do. My wife was fed up with me hanging around doing nothing.'

He said many men of his generation, struggle with a loss of identity and purpose when they retire.

They are also more likely to suffer from poor physical and mental health. Official figures show men born in Australia are dying almost seven years younger than women on average, at 77.8 years compared with 84.5 years.

Despite being one of the healthiest counties in the world, we still have a glaring health gap between men and women," said Glen Poole, chief executive of the Australian Men's Health

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WOODWORKING GROUP – Greg Righton

The last month has seen new machinery coming into the shed.

A new Micronair dust extraction system has been installed which incorporates a variable speed drive fan motor and a vibrating motor sitting a top 4 large dust filters. The VSD fan motor speed is variable and suction increases when more dust control gates are open as a

result of more machines being in use. It uses less power and is thus more efficient when less machines are in use. The VSD motor starts up slowly and will last much longer than a normal electric motor.

The biggest benefit is the use of only one sulo bin for the dust to be extracted into which means much less cleaning is required compared to the old system which apart from using a sulo bin it also incorporated cleaning fine dust from 10 socks and 10 buckets.

Removing the old dust extraction system was a major task with the metal wall and horizontal purlins of the front wall to the shed having to be firstly removed so that the 4 metre high unit could be extracted. The system was a number of components fitting into each other and to avoid removing the roof it took the Micronair contractor and 4 sheddies most of the day to remove the system. This was done by cutting out the bottom support platform with an angle grinder and then removing this platform and then the next 3 parts to the system lowering them to the ground one at a time.

The wall to the dust extraction room was then reinstalled and the door to the room repositioned to the right side of where it was previously.



Due to the old thicknesser starting to show signs of wear

and tear we purchased a new 3 phase, 7.5kw industrial SCM thicknesser. This Italian made machine is a semi-professional unit resulting in a greatly improved finish to the timber being reduced down. The cutting ability particularly on hardwood is vastly superior to the old machine.

Dave, our resident plumber and Greg from

Woodworking were able to help out the kitchen team with the installation of a new stainless steel

preparation sink. Greg sourced and installed a support bracket for the existing benchtop which the sink butted up to and also drilled the 50mm hole through the double cavity wall to take the waste pipe. Dave did his plumbing work gluing the pipework together and fitting the tapware.


The Royal Show preparations are coming along with the cutting and sanding of pine glut componentry for the sale of Christmas trees now almost completed. Dennis and Noel and a

As we start the cooler months the garden team has been using the benign conditions to propagate new plants for the Perth Royal Show and Gavin's geraniums in particular have been growing well.



We have a number of new red passionfruit plants available. They have been grown from seed harvested from the fruit in the picture below, kindly donated by Paul Setchell. Paul's vine started flowering during November last year and the fruit ripened from the end of February onwards. Our vines should therefore follow suit by flowering and fruiting early, unlike many varieties which only flower from mid-March onwards which leads to most of the fruit being unable to ripen due to insufficient heat and hours of sunlight. en's shed



In anticipation of the winter winds, we have erected some wind barriers to protect the nursery plants as far as possible. The shade cloth screens have the added bonus of screening out the dilapidated parts of the Centenary Building.

Our butternut harvest is almost at an end with Dennis having already enjoyed 2 big specimens. The last one is pictured left.





Gavin has been busy liaising with various Rotary Clubs and their landscape gardener about

plants for a development in Congdon Street, North Fremantle which is to provide accommodation for over 55year-old homeless women. A large number of plants have been delivered to the development since the photo right.

During May we completed the installation of a more suitable commercial kitchen sink and tap in our kitchen storeroom and also replaced our outdated gas cooktop which was not equipped with the required safety device which would stop a flame-failure to occur.

RECIPE OF THE MONTH – Werner Ribul

Moroccan Chicken with Olives and preserved Lemon

This is a slow-cooked Moroccan stew made with chicken thighs, onions, olives, saffron, and preserved lemons - full of flavour and easy to make. Best served with some steamed Couscous.

Prep Time:20 minutes + 1 hourServes: 6Cook Time:70-85 minutesTotal Time:180 minutes

Ingredients

- 6 chicken leg quarters, skin removed
- 1 large onion, thinly sliced
- 1 small, preserved lemon
- 1 cup of pitted green olives
- 1 bunch of fresh coriander, roughly chopped
- salt & freshly cracked black pepper to taste

For the marinade:

- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 6 garlic cloves, grated
- ¹/₂ teaspoon ground dried ginger
- 1 teaspoon sweet paprika
- A pinch of saffron threads plus ¹/₄ cup boiling water
- ¹/₄ cup chopped fresh parsley
- ¹/₂ teaspoon ground cumin
- ¹/₂ teaspoon ground coriander itablespoon honey





• [optional: ¹/₂ teaspoon ground turmeric]

Method

- 1) **Marinate the chicken**: combine all of the marinade ingredients together in a large bowl. Add the chicken. Quarter the preserved lemon and remove the pulp. Chop the pulp and add to the chicken. Add the lemon peel (thinly sliced, optional) and toss the chicken in the marinade to coat. Let stand for an hour or, **preferably**, overnight in the refrigerator for maximum flavour.
- 2) Preheat the oven to 160 °C (fan-forced).
- 3) Fry the onion with 3-4 tablespoons of olive oil in a large casserole over medium heat until soft and golden, about 8 minutes.
- 4) Add the chicken with all of the marinade and top with the olives. Cover the casserole with a lid or aluminium foil and bake for 30 minutes. Remove the lid/foil and bake for an additional 30-45 minutes at 200 °C.
- 5) Sprinkle with the chopped coriander and serve with some steamed Cous-cous.

Recipe Notes

Allow about 60g of steamed cous-cous per person to go with the Moroccan chicken.

Many of the members who have joined this group are interested in learning more about computing or how to better manage their smartphone, desktop, tablet, or laptop.


New WiFi for the Shed

We needed an internet connection in the Flight Simulator building. The Shed also required an upgrade in the number of simultaneous connections as larger groups of members visit the Shed and usually automatically connect their smartphones or laptops to our Shed WiFi.

The original Telstra 4GX modem-router was performing well and rather than junk it, we decided to simply move it the Flight Sim Building. The "mesh" component of the Shed Wifi was also performing well so that was left unchanged.

Because of its unique location, the Shed required a "non-NBN" solution and the 4GX service was very critical in keeping the WiFi available during the 2022 Royal Show, (even on a day where every other Internet Service was off-line for some hours).

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


"5th Generation" solutions, so we found one on eBay. This is where we took a few risks, however with testing to ensure the WiFi and Ethernet connections were still working, we installed the new WiFi without a glitch.

The change should be transparent to all existing connections because there is no change to the SSID or passwords. Some members may notice the new WiFi is even faster than the original setup.

If anyone wants to connect their smartphone, we have provided a QR Code

(remember those?) and connection can





be expedited by pointing the camera in your phone at the QR Code which is on the notice board near the attendance form as you check in. Look for a message on the screen and with one "tap" you are connected. (Do not press the camera button).


Moving Your Apple Photos Library to an External Disk

If you have an Apple MacBook with a relatively small hard drive, you may have experienced an issue with the size of your Photos App library.

As we explained to Bill, when his MacBook hard drive was nearing capacity, the main thing causing his problem was too many *videos and photos*. So, we decided to move his "PHOTOS" library to new external disk.

The internal MacBook disk storage was being managed by Apple Software due the fact that Bill had invested in extra iCloud storage (via his Apple Account). Photos taken on his iPhone were being uploaded to the iCloud and backed up in full size. However, because of the size restriction inherent in his MacBook, they could not all be replicated to his laptop computer.


We copied the Photos Library to a spare 1-Tera-byte external disk. Then, we simply



opened that copy and waited for the new "Use as System Library" preference to take effect. We also set his iCloud Preferences to: "Download Originals to this iMac".

The changes worked, and before long all the original iPhone Photos were downloaded to his MacBook. To create an extra backup, we made sure the external disk for "Time Machine" was set up.

Our Computer and Smart Phone Help Desk is open by appointment, and you are welcome to bring your PC, Tablet or smart phone or just use one of our desktop PCs/Macs.

Whatever you decide, almost always, a password is required. So bring a copy of those credentials for your Google/Microsoft/Apple/ TidyHQ account sign-on(s) to the Shed.

CNC GROUP – John Hassell

The CNC Group now has eight people qualified to operate the CNC machine.

John Hassell is the Group leader with Otti Ott the deputy leader.

The Group is busy creating products for sale at the Royal Show. Along with the very successful 'Cut While You Wait' nameplates we did last year, we are producing Pterodactyl kits and specialty name plates featuring a Tyrannosaurus Rex logo.

We hope to exceed the 600 name plates we sold at last year's Show with a target of 800 for this year. Already the Group has cut 300 blanks.

Otti designed the Pterodactyl kit and we are in the process of cutting 150 of these for sale at the Show. A sample can be seen flying in the Shed. We also plan to cut a monster version as a display piece for the Shed during the Show.





FLIGHT SIMULATOR – Nick Bagshaw

Through the generosity of Derek Froud our Shed acquired a complete Boeing 737 flight simulator (FS) late last year. Derek, a former Qantas pilot, spent more than a decade building the FS at his home. Like other enthusiasts, he incorporated real B737 parts into his FS: seats, column yokes, steering tiller and some instruments. Sadly, due to health reasons Derek moved to more appropriate accommodation and the FS had to leave his home. By chance, Derek's

nephew Jason Froud (a fellow Shed member) lives next to our President Peter Panek. One thing led to another and, as they say, the rest is history.

The FS is a complicated machine, computer controlled with a suite of software programs, lots of instruments and masses of wiring. Because the machine had to be removed from Derek's home in somewhat of a hurry, the reassembly instructions for hardware, wiring diagrams and computer software were very limited – an additional challenge for the FS team as the rebuilding commenced in a small building close to the Shed.





Over the last few months much progress has been made despite frustrations in better understanding how the computer hardware was set up and the quite complex suite of software programs evaluated. We only had limited access to Derek due to his situation.

The team of Calvin Munro, Danny Burgess and Mike Glasson have made much progress in building a more complete cockpit structure to house the instrument modules and the overhead projector which provides the image of airports and flight. Mike has also made significant progress in labelling the challenging mass of wires behind the instrument panels and how they connect to the computer. John Hassell has sorted out computer hardware problems



and Les Gunn has installed internet access; he is currently focusing on evaluating the software.

We have been fortunate in making contact with Tony Strickland, an old friend of Derek's and a former fellow pilot who has at home a very complete desktop FS. He has in the past sat with Derek in his FS so has first-hand knowledge of its operation. And he is able, on occasion, to talk to Derek about specific queries. Interestingly, Tony has just joined our Shed so he will be able to take an increasing involvement in the commissioning and operation of the FS.



Once we have the FS in some form of routine operation, we can draw on fellow Shed member John Murdoch who is a current B737 captain to assist with further enhancement of the FS. In addition, at least two other current B737 pilots have expressed an interest in being involved.

What's the timeframe for "routine operation"? We think at least several more months. Then we can consider giving fellow Shed members and their families a flying experience from Perth

Airport to their favorite destinations. Obviously it would be advantageous to have the general public attending this year's Royal Show to be able to take flights, and that is a key aim of the Group but with no guarantee at this stage. Further out, we are contemplating having school groups attend to gain an interesting flight experience.

No doubt some of you have sat in commercial simulators here in Perth or elsewhere. They provide a stimulating and challenging experience which we hope to emulate. To whet your appetite, go to a range of YouTube videos for more information.



Robert, when he's not pencil drawing House of Windsor and SCMS royalty, turns out some amazing pastel works on a regular basis.







Photography Projects to Date

The Photography Group has conducted three projects to date. The purpose of each projects is to challenge our members to utilise the knowledge and skills learnt in our workshops on topics such as "Composition", "Managing Light", 'Aperture Priority", etc. The first project titled "Tranquility we received some very interesting photos taken all over the State and in fact the world taken by our members, with 59 photos submitted for consideration. 




This month we are conducting an Astro Photography Project led by John Bolto. After the very interesting Workshop on 18 May the subsequent field trip had to be postponed due to extensive cloud cover; but the plan is to reschedule it at the next suitable evening.

Training/Induction/Help Forum

A number of topics were identified at our first workshop in January for one-on-one training to members on various photography topics such as "Scanning Slides/Photos/Negatives" "Using Photopils app" which has commenced; and others planned to commence during the next six months for "Flying a Drone": "Sizing and printing photos"; "Editing photos in Lightroom/Photoshop", Creating/Editing short videos". Induction for new members on the use of Google Classroom and our photo website for photography group members has also been conducted by our more experienced photographers.





Photography Program July to December 2023
